Brookdale Hospital Medical Center began operation in 1910 and is one of three hospital campuses of One Brooklyn Health System, Inc. (OBH), an existing not-for-profit, tax-exempt corporation licensed under Article 28 of the Public Health Law and the active sponsor of Brookdale Hospital Medical Center (BHMC). BHMC also recently became the active operating agency of Interfaith Medical Center (IMC), and Kingsbrook Jewish

Medical Center (KJMC) from a merger of the latter two into BHMC. BHMC covers a 10-acre campus plus six Brookdale Family Care Centers, with buildings devoted to inpatient, ambulatory, long-term care, senior living, and emergency medicine.

BHMC currently operates 3 inpatient psychiatric programs, 5 Mental Health Outpatient Treatment and Rehabilitative Services (MHOTRS) programs, a Comprehensive Psychiatric Emergency Program (CPEP), and an Apartment Treatment program. All are in good standing with the Office of Mental Health (OMH).

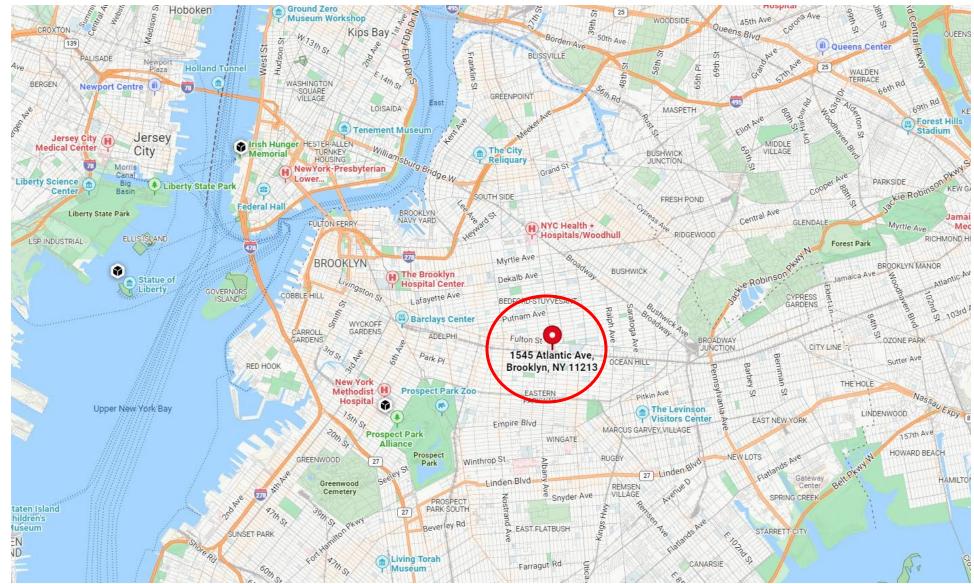
Need

The purpose of this project is to upgrade and modernize the inpatient psychiatric unit. The layout of the 9th floor has not been renovated in over thirty years. In order for the service to meet current design standards, it is necessary to reduce the current bed configuration from 60 beds to 50 beds, which will include two units of 25 beds each. The existing configuration includes 4-bedded rooms, which are no longer compliant with code and the space is not 100% ADA compliant. The renovated 9th floor will be designed to include 12 semiprivate rooms and 1 private room on each of the two units (24 semi-private rooms and 2 private rooms on the floor) and will be 100% ADA accessible. The proposed renovations will also help the program meet current psychiatric care guidelines and will reduce overcrowding on the unit and enhance the therapeutic environment.

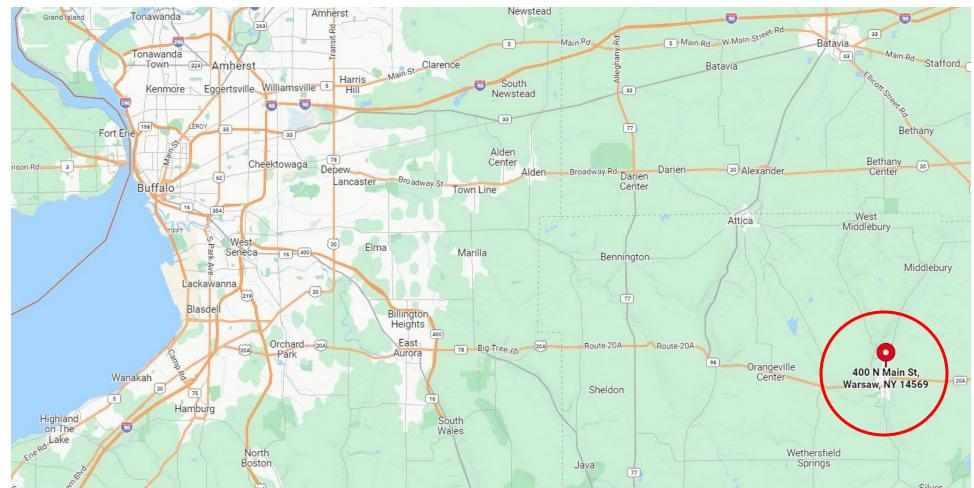
This project is the result of a CAH Study conducted by WCCHS in 2017 that showed positive financial benefits for WCCH by converting to CAH designation of between \$1.8M and \$2.6M. The report estimated that conversion to CAH status would result in an overall increase in Medicare, Medicaid, and Medicare Advantage net patient reimbursement totaling \$631K in FY21, increasing to a net benefit of \$2,365K in FY22, and \$2,266K in FY23, a significant financial advantage.

All Medicare-participating hospitals designated by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services can have no more than 25 inpatient beds, plus a maximum 10-bed psychiatric unit and/or a 10-bed inpatient rehabilitation unit. WCCH reached out to CMS to inquire about a possible waiver request to retain the current 12 psychiatric beds but were informed that a waiver could not be granted. Accordingly, WCCH must reduce its inpatient psychiatric beds to meet the inpatient bed requirement.

Occupancy rate for the past three years has been 87.6% in 2021, 87.9% 2022, and thus far 84% in 2023. The two-bed reduction is projected to result in a utilization rate close to 100%.

Financial solvency and survival of this critical health care service to the rural communities of Western NY is the primary need for this project. While the project impact is the loss of two beds, the end result is the survival of 10 inpatient psychiatric beds.

Refuah Health Center, Inc. is a Not-For-Profit provider of Article 28 Diagnostic and Treatment service provider, also designated as a Federally Qualified Health Center. It was founded in 1992 by members of the community of Rockland County to provide access to primary health care and greater access to mental health treatment. Since its opening Refuah has grown into a full-service, integrated, multi-specialty healthcare organization with four service sites and a fleet of mobile medical units.

Refuah indicates it uses a patient-centered model of care focused on increasing access and an integrated team of clinicians in adult and pediatric primary care from a variety of medical specialties. Refuah also operates a comprehensive dental program and a fully staffed behavioral and mental health division that is integrated into its primary care program.

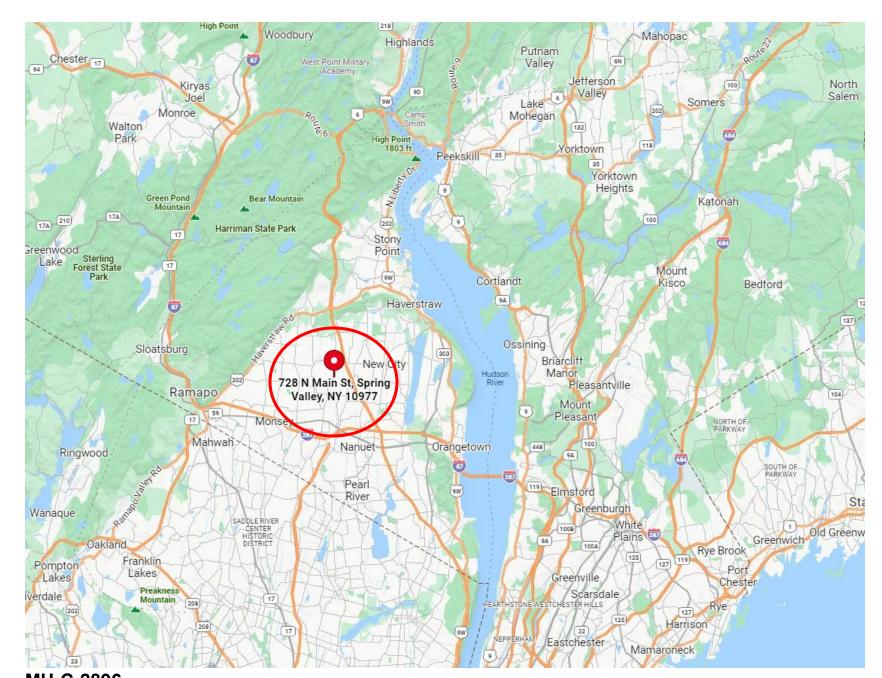
Need

Refuah currently provides mental health services to roughly 1,500 clients annually at its Article 28 primary care clinic; however, the clinic is approaching the 30% licensure threshold of total annual visits. To continue to provide mental health services unencumbered, Refuah is seeking OMH certification to serve beyond what the threshold allows.

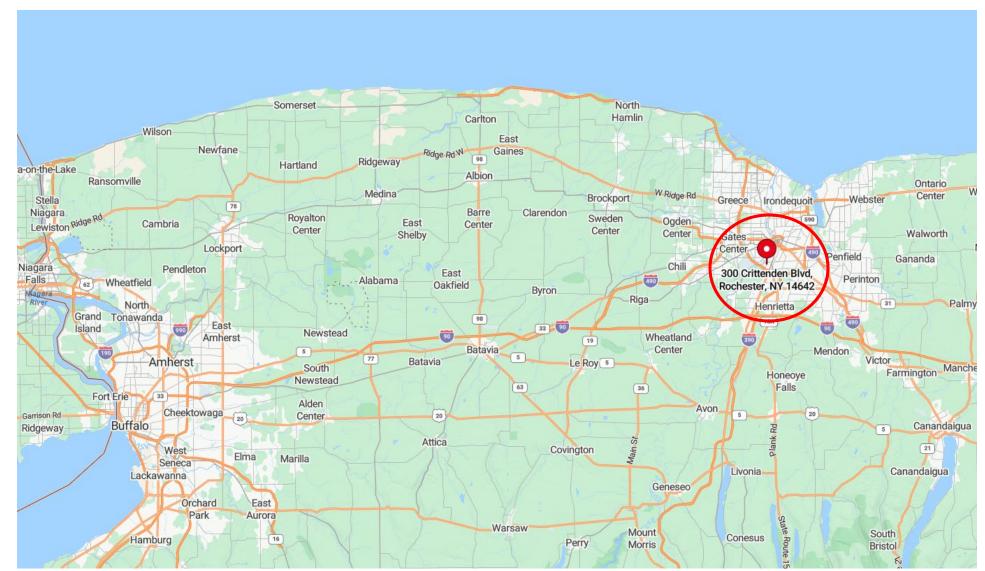

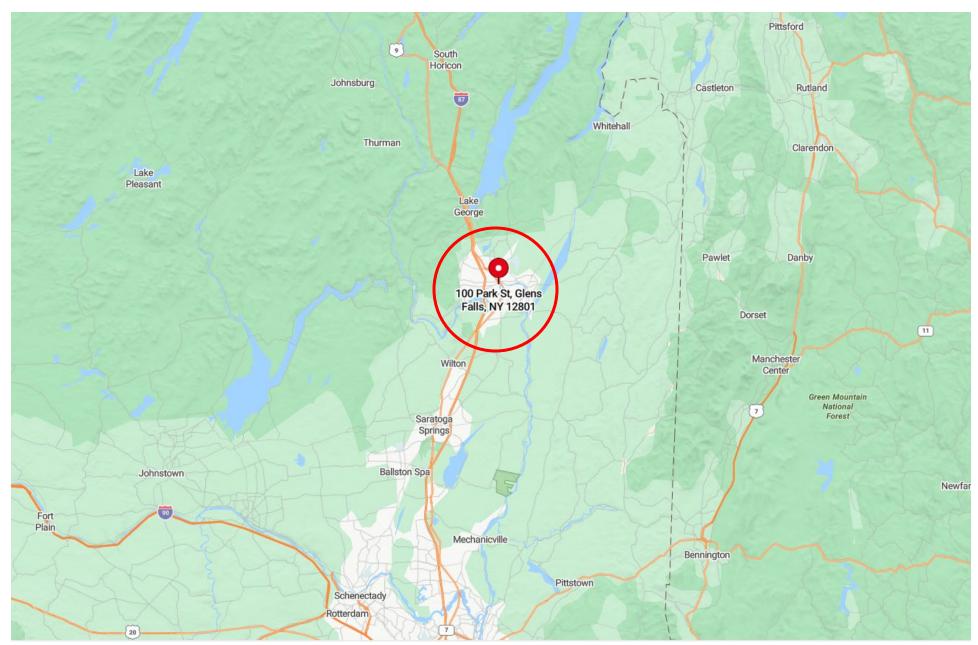

SAFE Foundation, Inc. (SAFE) is requesting approval to establish a Mental Health Outpatient Treatment and Rehabilitative Services (MHOTRS) program to serve Adolescents ages 16 and up, and Adults. This program will specialize in eating disorders in addition to other mental health disorders. The mission of the program is to

provide eating disorder treatment in Brooklyn. They currently provide New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS) licensed services.

The proposed program plans to provide an array of services for those with eating disorders and other mental health challenges such as anxiety, depression, trauma, and obsessive-compulsive disorder. The program seeks to establish timely identification and treatment of eating disorders, provide integrated care for co-occurring psychiatric and/or substance use disorders, and reduce the need for inpatient and other higher levels of care (i.e., partial hospital, and inpatient programs).

Need

Per the National Association of Anorexia Nervosa and Associated Disorders (ANAD), it is estimated that 9% of the U.S. population will have an eating disorder in their lifetime, and that twice as many women have eating disorders than men. The pandemic has shown a sharp increase in the prevalence of eating disorders. A third of those residing in Brooklyn have reported struggles with money and its effect on buying groceries that leads to skipping meals which may create anxiety about food.

Brooklyn is one of the most diverse urban areas in the country and eating disorders have been shown to be equally prevalent among diverse populations. Members of these communities are less likely to access mental health services to treat eating disorders. It is estimated that of the 2.58 million residents in Brooklyn, approximately 9% of them can be expected to experience an eating disorder, 1 in 5 between the ages of 10 and 29. The Asian community, that makes up 30% of Southern Brooklyn, is more prone to practicing purging and food restrictions, and the LGBTQI+ population

experiences up to seven times more eating disorders than those outside of their community.

Medical conditions such as diabetes, both Type 1 and Type 2, metabolic syndrome, asthma, and digestive issues are prevalent in individual with eating disorders. They can also lead to other health challenges such as cardiac issues, as well as hormonal and digestive issues. There is also a connection between some eating disorders and tobacco use. Individuals with binge eating disorders and bulimia nervosa are more likely to be life-long smokers, compounding health concerns and issues.

The program plans to address these needs through outreach education, and cultural awareness practices in their service delivery. They will provide prevention and early intervention services, such as school initiatives, to advance recognition of eating disorders. These efforts include establishing relationships with providers than can work well with individuals who are uninsured. By working with other providers and through outreach in the medical community, the program seeks to educate the community and develop a system of care to help those with eating disorders determine their own recovery.

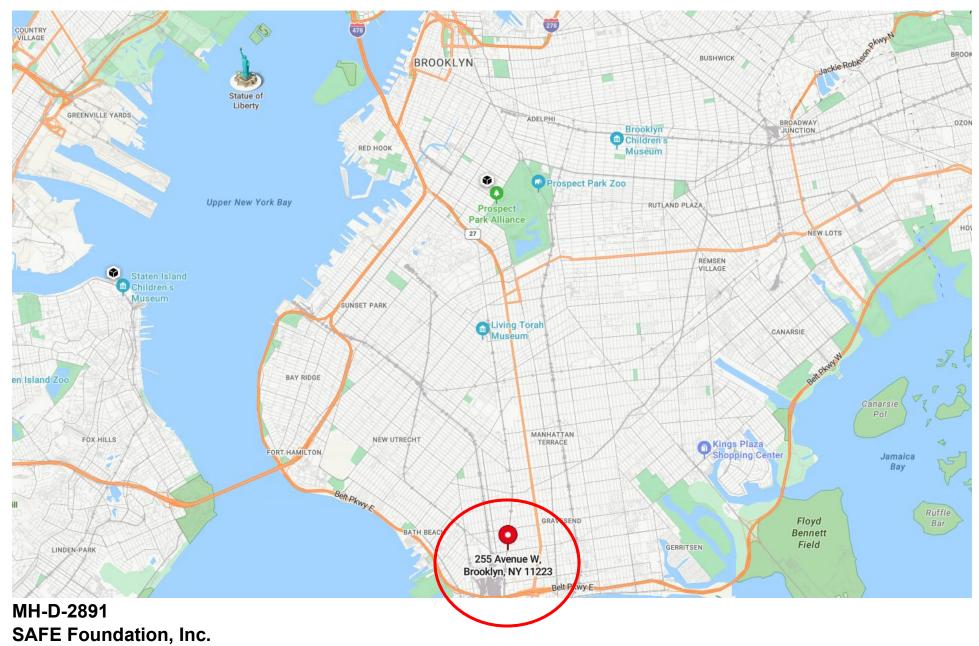

Lasante Health Center (LHC) is a not-for-profit corporation established in 2013 to provide quality health services for, Children, Adolescents, and Adults living in NYC. They are a New York State licensed Article 28 Diagnostic and Treatment Center, and a Federally Qualified Health Center Look-Alike. They currently provide physical health and mental health services, regardless of the individual's ability to pay.

LHC offers a full array of medical services and have established themselves in a culturally diverse community. Many of their physicians and staff are multilingual and able to speak with patients in their preferred language. They provide cultural awareness and sensitivity training to staff, to ensure the experience and services provided are meeting the needs of the diverse community.

LHC also looks to ensure that recipients and their families have a voice. They will provide annual reports of the consumer satisfaction surveys to the board of directors. Change and improvements to the program will be based on the experiences of the individuals served. This information will come through input from the Consumer Advisory Committee. The committee will meet quarterly and provide the governing body with the information they gather, which in turn will assist in the planning of the proposed program.

Need

As the mental health crisis continues, LHC is working to meet the needs of the community within the limitations they have without having OMH licensure. This limits the amount of mental health services they can provide to 30% of their annual volume of services. During the pandemic they were able to provide much needed MH services to the community through telehealth, and this in turn increased the number of people receiving these services. Through the proposed MHTORS program, LHC looks to continue providing services to their existing recipients and expand to meet the need of more individuals in need of services.

During the period of March 1, 2021, though March 1, 2022, LHC provided MH services to 285 people with 2,223 visits. These visits included individual psychotherapy and medication therapy. They expect to serve approximately 400-500 individuals at the proposed MHOTRS program. They look to reach out to those who are uninsured or indigent and offer services that meet the needs of the community.

LHC plans to meet the needs of the culturally diverse community. The make-up of the community includes 33.8% African American, 12.7% Asian, and 18.9% Latino. They also indicate that 14.4% over the age of 65, 22.7% under the age of 18, with 52.6% being female, and 47.4% male. The gender identity, ethnicity, and cultural identity will also be a part of the program's awareness and consideration in the provision of services. All staff will receive annual trainings to ensure that this awareness is consistent throughout the program. The program will ensure that staff hired are representative of the community, and many will be bilingual.

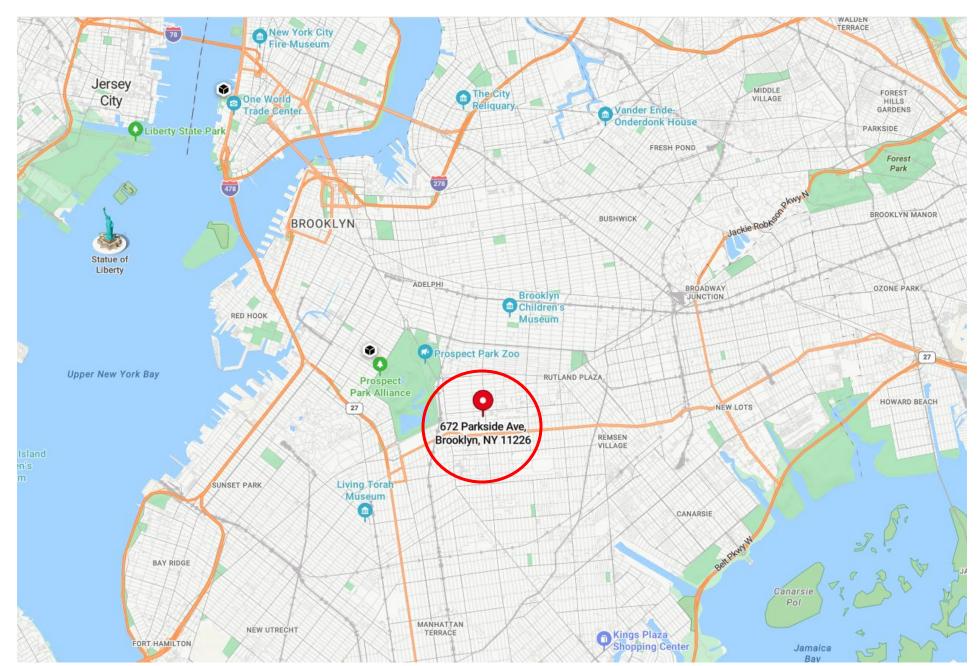

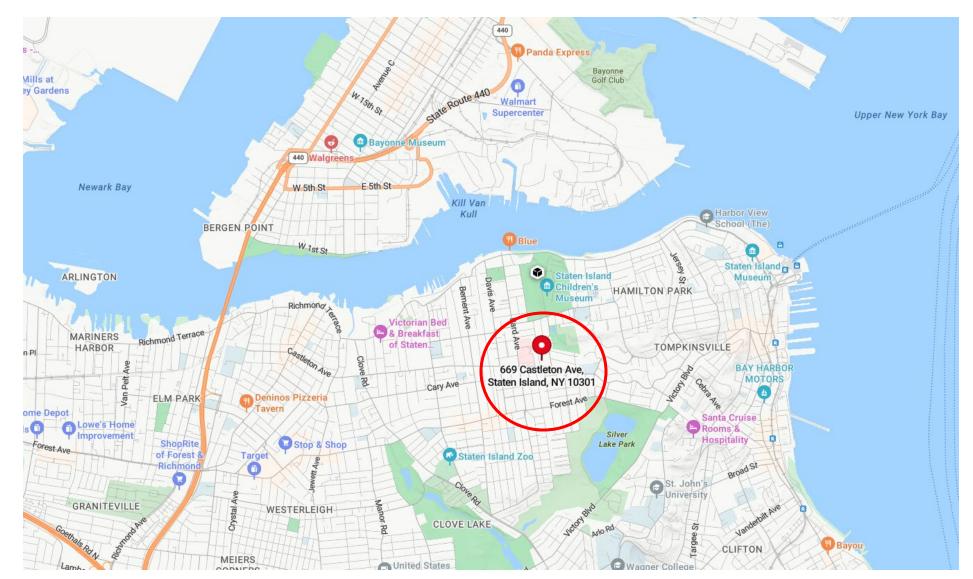

Richmond University Medical Center (RUMC) has received a Statewide Health Care Facility Transformation Program (SHCFTP) Grant to fund the cost of this project at RUMC's existing Mental Health Outpatient Treatment and Rehabilitative Services (MHOTRS) program, CHAIT Child/Adolescent Mental Health Outpatient Clinic, which serves Children, Adolescents, and Adults.

The space will be renovated to accommodate an Article 28 Pediatric Primary Care program with both well and sick waiting areas, 2 ADA patient toilets, 1 staff toilet, 1 exam room, a clean room, a soiled room and a lab work area. The finishes throughout the remaining areas of the Article 31 MHOTRS program will be upgraded as well. As part of the project, the HVAC system for the second floor will be updated and a new fire alarm system will be installed. The renovation project will take roughly seven (7) months to complete.

There will be no reduction in services during construction. Construction will occur in stages. There are three (3) clinical offices that will be impacted, which are located in the hallway of the proposed integrated primary care clinic. The staff in those offices will relocate to offices next door at the Hospital's Elizabeth Pouch Center Early Childhood Program until construction is completed. The Elizabeth Pouch Center is an early childhood center operated by the Hospital that offers outpatient mental health services to children with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities. Services will also be offered via telehealth during construction. The Program Director and Medical Director will determine with the clinicians which clients are appropriate for telehealth services. The client and their parent/guardian will have the right to decline telehealth services and continue to receive services in person.
