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1. Introduction and Background

1.1 Purpose of the Request for Proposal

The New York State (NYS) Office of Mental Health (OMH) announces the availability of funds for the development of one (1) Older Adult Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) team: one (1) size 48 capacity team in the Bronx. The ACT team will serve older adults who have Serious Mental Illness (SMI) and have not been successfully engaged by the traditional mental health treatment and rehabilitation system in NYS.

ACT is a multidisciplinary, evidence-based, team approach to providing comprehensive and flexible treatment, support, and rehabilitation services. ACT teams are configured to have a low individual-to-staff ratio or no more than 10 individuals to each staff (10:1) with professional staff including members from the fields of psychiatry, nursing, psychology, social work, substance use, employment/education, and peers. A majority of services are provided by ACT staff directly (not brokered) and in the community or where the individual lives. In this way, newly acquired skills are applied in their real-world environment and situations. ACT is designed to be flexible and responsive to the needs of individuals, offering support 24 hours a day, seven (7) days a week. ACT is "assertive" and intentional in its engagement methods, incorporating individual choice, cultural competences, concrete services, consistency, and persistence. Finally, ACT is structured to provide a review during team meetings of every individual on the ACT team's caseload. This level of accountability allows for immediate changes in service planning and leads to improved outcomes.

ACT teams strive to develop a culturally sensitive understanding of each individual and their family's personal preferences (i.e., preferred pronoun, spiritual practices). Additionally, ACT teams take into account social determinants as they are domains likely to have inherent disparities (healthcare access, housing, employment status, food security). ACT teams provide on- going opportunities for individuals to share their culture with others. ACT staff elicit and accept individuals' personal religious or spiritual practices and leverage this information to support self-directed recovery goals.

ACT teams serve adults who are diagnosed with a SMI. These individuals may also be high users of emergency and/or crisis services, have cooccurring substance use disorders, are isolated from community supports (including family), in danger of losing their housing/becoming homeless, homeless, and/or have histories of involvement with the criminal justice system.

The expansion of ACT to older adults represents a commitment by the NYS OMH to develop ACT teams designed to better meet the needs of specific populations, e.g., increasing access to an evidence-based practice for adults with SMI who have high continuous needs that are not met in traditional community-based services. As this expansion moves

forward, there are several principles that inform the overall process, including:

- Promoting the concepts of recovery and the power of individual choice.
- Supporting the seamless integration of individuals into the communities in which they have chosen to live. ACT teams are expected to become experts in the natural supports available to recipients so that full community integration is possible.
- Supporting individuals to develop a vocational or educational plan that will provide a path to independence.
- Supporting adults who may have limited social or family support to strengthen existing family relationships, including their family of choice.
- Reviewing and attempting to mitigate the effects of discrimination based on the client's demographic identity (gender, sexual identity, race, ethnicity). Team shows sensitivity towards individuals' personal stories as they may relate to oppression and inequality.
- Ensuring service access by managing ACT referrals through the Local Government Unit (LGU) Single Point of Access (SPOA) system.
- Ensuring the continuous quality improvement of ACT services through regular monitoring of treatment/rehabilitation outcomes by both the ACT agency and NYS OMH.
- Facilitating continuity of care from the ACT team to the community when transitioning off ACT; and
- Utilizing data to inform continuous program improvement.

1.2 Target Population/Eligibility Criteria

The target population to be served by Older Adult ACT include adults 55 years old and older diagnosed with SMI that have had difficulty engaging in the traditional mental health system. These individuals may be high users of emergency and/or crisis services, isolated from community supports (including family), in danger of losing their housing/becoming homeless, homeless, and/or have histories of involvement with the criminal justice system.

Eligibility Criteria for ACT:

• 2023 ACT Guidelines

Additional Criteria for Older Adult ACT teams

- At least 55 years old¹; and
- Existing chronic medical condition or newly diagnosed medical condition within the last 12 months.

¹¹ The Geriatric Mental Health Act demonstrations start at age 55 and above in recognition of the accelerated aging process experienced by those with co-occurring mental and physical health conditions.

2. Proposal Submissions

2.1 Designated Contact/Issuing Officer

OMH has assigned an Issuing Officer for this project. The Issuing Officer or a designee shall be the sole point of contact regarding the RFP from the date of issuance of the RFP until the issuance of the Notice of Conditional Award. To avoid being deemed non-responsive, an applicant is restricted from making contact with any other personnel of OMH regarding the RFP. Certain findings of non-responsibility can result in rejection for a contract award. The Issuing Officer for this RFP is:

*OMH strongly advises that applicants do not wait until the last day/last few hours to complete and submit applications/proposals to Grant RFPs. Exceptions will not be considered or made for an applicant who cannot complete their proposal/application by the due date and time of the RFP.

2.3 Disposition of Proposals

All proposals submitted by the due date and time become the property of OMH. Any proposals not received by the due date and time do not get reviewed and are excluded from consideration.

2.4 Eligible Agencies

Eligible applicants are not-for-profit agencies with 501(c) (3) incorporation, that have experience providing mental health services to persons with serious mental illness.

Please be advised that all questions regarding Eligibility will be responded to through the official posting of the Questions and Answers. No questions about Eligibility will be responded to either individually or prior to the posting of the Q&As.

2.5 **RFP Questions and Clarifications**

All questions or requests for clarification concerning the RFP shall be submitted in writing to the Issuing Officer by e-mail to <u>OMHLocalProcurement@omh.ny.gov</u> by 2:00 PM EST on the "Questions Due" date indicated in section 2.2 and will be limited to addressing only those questions submitted by the deadline. No questions can be submitted or will be answered after this date. No questions will be answered by telephone or in person.

The questions and official answers will be posted on the OMH website as indicated in section 2.2.

2.6 Addenda to Request for Proposals

In the event that it becomes necessary to revise any part of the RFP during the application submission period, an addendum will be posted on the OMH website, the Grants Gateway, and the NYS Contract Reporter.

It is the applicant's responsibility to periodically review the NYS OMH website, the NYS Contract Reporter and Grants Gateway to learn of revisions or addendums to this RFP. No other notification will be given.

2.7 Disqualification Factors

Following the opening of bids, a preliminary review of all proposals will be conducted by the Issuing Officer or a designee to review each proposal's submission for completeness and verify that all eligibility criteria have been met. Additionally, during the proposal evaluation process, evaluators will also be reviewing eligibility criteria and confirming that they have been met. During the course of either of these review processes, proposals that do not meet basic participation standards will be disqualified, specifically:

- Proposals from applicants that do not meet the eligibility criteria as outlined in 2.4; or
- Proposals that do not comply with bid submission and/or required format instructions as specified in 2.10 or
- Proposals from eligible not-for-profit applicants who have not completed Vendor Prequalification, as described in 2.10, by the proposal due date of 2:00 PM EST as indicated in section 2.2

2.8 Grants Gateway Requirement

Pursuant to the New York State Division of Budget Bulletin H-1032, dated June 7, 2013, New York State has instituted key reform initiatives to the grant contract process which require not-for-profits to register in the <u>Grants Gateway</u> and complete the Vendor Prequalification process in order for proposals to be evaluated and any resulting contracts executed.

Proposals received from eligible not-for-profit applicants who have not been Prequalified by the proposal due date of 2:00 PM EST as indicated in section 2.2 cannot be evaluated; therefore, such proposals will be disqualified from further consideration.

Please do not delay in beginning and completing the prequalification process. The State reserves five (5) days to review submitted prequalification applications. Prequalification applications submitted to the State for review less than 5 days prior to the RFP due date and time may not be considered. Applicants should not assume their prequalification information will be reviewed if they do not adhere to this timeframe.

2.9 Instructions for Bid Submission and Required Format

NOTE: For any application that does not contain all the required documentation and/or "See Attached" responses that were to be uploaded, please be advised that the application will be reviewed and scored as submitted. For any incomplete response or missing and/or inappropriately submitted documentation, points will be deducted. It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure, prior to submission, that the application is appropriate and complete.

Each proposal submission through the Grants Gateway is required to contain:

- Operating Budget (Appendix B)
- Budget Narrative (Appendix B1)

All applicants must be registered with the New York State Grants Gateway System (GGS) and all Not-for-Profit agencies must be prequalified prior to proposal submission.

Include your SFS Vendor ID on the form; if you are a new vendor and do not have a SFS Vendor ID, include a Substitute for W-9 with your signed, notarized registration (also available from the website). Proposals must be submitted online via the Grants Gateway by the date and time posted on the cover of this RFP. Tutorials (training videos) for use of the Grants Gateway (and upon user log in):

You must use Microsoft Edge to access the Grants Gateway. Using Chrome or Firefox causes errors in the Work Plan section of the application.

To apply, log into the Grants Gateway as a Grantee, Grantee Contract Signatory or Grantee System Administrator and click on the View Opportunities button under View Available Opportunities. To get started, in the Search Criteria, enter the Grant Opportunity name provided on the cover page of this RFP, select the Office of Mental Health as the Funding Agency, and hit the Search button. Click on the name of the Grant Opportunity from the search results grid and then click on the APPLY FOR GRANT OPPORTUNITY button located at the bottom left of the Main page of the Grant Opportunity.

In order to access the online proposal and other required documents such as the attachments, you MUST be registered and logged into the NYS Grants Gateway system in the user role of either a "Grantee" or a "Grantee Contract Signatory" or a "Grantee System Administrator".

The 'Grantee' role may ONLY Initiate and Save changes to the application such as add/update information to forms, upload documents while the user logged in as a 'Grantee Contract Signatory' or a 'Grantee System Administrator' role can perform all the tasks of Grantee role and in addition, can SUBMIT the application to the State. When the application is ready for submission, click the 'Status Changes' tab, then click the 'Apply Status' button under "APPLICATION SUBMITTED" before the due date and time.

2.10 Instructions for completing the Workplan and Objectives in NYS Grants Gateway

The Workplan Overview Form will be used to create the Work Plan portion of the contract. Some of the information requested will be duplicative of information provided earlier in the application. Be sure to follow the guidance provided below.

The Work Plan Period should reflect the anticipated contract period. Contracts will be approved for a five-year term.

The Project Summary section should include a high-level overview of the project as instructed.

The Organizational Capacity section should include the information requested regarding staffing and relevant experience of staff and any applicable consultants to be involved in undertaking the proposed project. The Objectives and Tasks section should identify grantee-defined objectives and tasks that are relevant to the completion of the proposed project. To get started, add your first Objective Name and Description, and then click the [SAVE] button at the top of the page. After hitting Save, a field for the Task Name and Task Description will show under the Objective box. Complete both fields and hit the [SAVE] button at the top of the page. After entering the Task information and clicking Save, you will now see a box for the Performance Measure information and a box to enter a second Task. Enter a Performance Measure Name and select the Performance Measure Data Capture Type from the dropdown box. The type you choose from the dropdown will show on the screen for you to complete. Once you've entered the name, data capture type and the text/integer/or date as applicable, click the [SAVE] button at the top of the page.

For Performance Measure Name restate the Objective then enter the narrative requested in the box below. Performance Measures are also grantee-defined and should reflect some measurable benchmark(s) in order to demonstrate adequate progress as required by the RFP. Once entered, click Save. You may continue to add Objectives, Tasks and Performance Measures up to and including the max amount allowed by the state.

The online Workplan is essentially an outline/summary of the work associated with the Project(s) described in the sections above. Please note that if an application is selected for award, the Workplan will be subject to change and can be updated during the contract development/negotiation process. Applicants should refer to Section 5.2.4 Grantee Defined Workplan of the 'Grantee User Guide' (<u>Click here for Grants Gateway: Vendor User</u> <u>Guide</u>) for detailed instructions on how to complete the Workplan.

3. Administrative Information

3.1 Reserved Rights

OMH reserves the right to:

- Reject any or all proposals received in response to the RFP that are deemed non-responsive or do not meet the minimum requirements or are determined to be otherwise unacceptable, in the agency's sole discretion;
- Withdraw the RFP at any time, at the agency's sole discretion
- Make an award under the RFP in whole or in part;
- Disqualify and applicant whose conduct and/or proposal fails to conform to the requirements of the RFP;
- Seek clarifications and revisions of proposals for the purposes of assuring a full understanding of the responsiveness to this solicitation requirements;
- Use proposal information obtained through the state's investigation of an applicant's qualifications, experience, ability or financial standing, and any material or information submitted by the applicant in response to the agency's request for clarifying information in the course of evaluation and/or selection under the RFP;
- Prior to the bid opening, direct applicants to submit proposal modifications addressing subsequent RFP amendments;
- Prior to the bid opening, amend the RFP specifications to correct errors or oversight, supply additional information, or extend any of the scheduled dates or requirements and provide notification to potential bidders via the OMH website, Grants Gateway, and the New York State (NYS) Contract Reporter;
- Eliminate any non-material specifications that cannot be complied with by all of the prospective applicants;
- Waive any requirements that are not material;
- Negotiate any aspect of the proposal with the successful applicant in order to ensure that the final agreement meets OMH objectives and is in the best interests of the State;
- Conduct contract negotiations with the next responsible applicant, should the agency be unsuccessful in negotiating with the selected applicant;
- Require clarification at any time during the procurement process and/or require correction of arithmetic or other apparent errors for the purpose of assuring a full and complete understanding of an applicant's proposal and/or to determine an applicant's compliance with the requirements of the solicitation;
- Cancel or modify contracts due to insufficiency of appropriations, cause, convenience, mutual consent, non-responsibility, or a "force majeure";

• Change any of the scheduled dates stated in the RFP.

3.2 Debriefing

OMH will issue award and non-award notifications to all applicants. Nonawarded applicants may request a debriefing in writing requesting feedback on their own proposal, within 15 business days of the OMH dated letter. OMH will not offer debriefing to providers who are awarded a team. OMH will not offer ranking, statistical, or cost information of other proposals until after the NYS Office of the State Comptroller has approved all awards under this RFP. Written debriefing requests may be sent to the Designated Contact, as defined in Section 2.1.

3.3 **Protests Related to the Solicitation Process**

Protests based on errors or omissions in the solicitation process, which are or should have been apparent prior to the deadline for receipt of all written questions for this RFP, must be filed prior to the deadline for questions. In the event an applicant files a timely protest based on error or omission in the solicitation process, the Commissioner of OMH or their designee will review such protest and may, as appropriate, issue a written response or addendum to the RFP to be posted on the OMH website in the RFP section. Protests of an award decision must be filed within fifteen (15) business days after the notice of conditional award or five (5) business days from the date of the debriefing. The Commissioner or their designee will review the matter and issue a written decision within twenty (20) business days of receipt of protest.

All protests must be in writing and must clearly and fully state the legal and factual grounds for the protest and include all relevant documentation. The written documentation should clearly state reference to the RFP title and due date. Such protests must be submitted to:

3.4 Term of Contracts

The contracts awarded in response to this RFP will be for a five-year term. Selected applicants awarded a contract under this RFP will be required to adhere to all terms and conditions in OMH's Master Grant Contract.

3.5 Minority and Women Owned Business Enterprises

OMH recognizes its obligation to promote opportunities for maximum feasible participation of certified minority and women-owned business enterprises (MWBEs) and the employment of minority group members and women in the performance of OMH. OMH expects that all contactors make a good-faith effort to utilize Minority and/or Women Owned Business Enterprises (M/WBE), on any award resulting from this

solicitation in excess of \$25,000 for commodities and services or \$100,000 for construction.

With respect to MWBEs, each award recipient must document its good faith efforts to provide meaningful opportunities for participation by MWBEs as subcontractors and suppliers in the performance of the project to be described in each grant disbursement agreement and must agree that OMH may withhold payment pending receipt of the required MWBE documentation. The directory of MWBEs can be viewed at https://ny.newnycontracts.com. For guidance on how OMH will determine a contractor's "good faith efforts", refer to 5 NYCRR §142.8. In accordance with 5 NYCRR § 142.13, each award recipient acknowledges that if it is found to have willfully and intentionally failed to comply with the MWBE participation goals set forth herein and in its grant disbursement agreements, such finding constitutes a breach of contract and OMH may withhold payment from the award recipient as liquidated damages.

Such liquidated damages shall be calculated as an amount equaling the difference between: (1) all sums identified for payment to MWBEs had the award recipient achieved the contractual MWBE goals; and (2) all sums paid to MWBEs for work performed or material supplied under the grant disbursement agreement.

By applying, an Applicant agrees to demonstrate its good faith efforts to achieve its goals for the utilization of MWBEs by submitting evidence thereof in such form as OMH shall require. Additionally, an Applicant may be required to submit the following documents and information as evidence of compliance with the foregoing:

A. An MWBE Utilization Plan, which shall be submitted in conjunction with the execution of the grant disbursement agreement except as otherwise authorized by OMH. Any modifications or changes to the MWBE Utilization Plan after the execution of the grant disbursement agreement must be reported on a revised MWBE Utilization Plan and submitted to OMH.

OMH will review the submitted MWBE Utilization Plan and advise the award recipient of OMH acceptance or issue a notice of deficiency within 30 days of receipt.

B. If a notice of deficiency is issued, the award recipient will be required to respond to the notice of deficiency within seven (7) business days of receipt by submitting to OMH, a written remedy in response to the notice of deficiency. If the written remedy that is submitted is not timely or is found by OMH to be inadequate, OMH shall notify the award recipient and direct the award recipient to submit within five (5) business days, a request for a partial or total waiver of MWBE participation goals. Failure to file the waiver form in a timely manner may be grounds for disqualification of the bid or proposal.

OMH may refuse to enter into a grant disbursement agreement, or terminate an existing grant disbursement agreement resulting from this solicitation, under the following circumstances:

a. If an award recipient fails to submit a MWBE Utilization Plan;

b. If an award recipient fails to submit a written remedy to a notice of deficiency;

c. If an award recipient fails to submit a request for waiver; or,d. If OMH determines that the award recipient has failed to document good faith efforts

The award recipient will be required to attempt to utilize, in good faith, any MBE or WBE identified within its MWBE Utilization Plan, during the performance of the project. Requests for a partial or total waiver of established goal requirements may be made at any time during the term of the project, but must be made no later than prior to the submission of a request for final payment under the grant disbursement agreement.

Each award recipient will be required to submit a Quarterly MWBE Contractor Compliance & Payment Report to OMH over the term of the project, in such form and at such time as OMH shall require, documenting the progress made toward achievement of the MWBE goals established for the project.

3.6 Participation Opportunities for New York State Certified Service-Disabled Veteran Owned Business

Article 17-B of the New York State Executive Law provides for more meaningful participation in public procurement by certified Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Business (SDVOB), thereby further integrating such businesses into New York State's economy. NYS OMH recognizes the need to promote the employment of service-disabled veterans and to ensure that certified service-disabled veteran-owned businesses have opportunities for maximum feasible participation in the performance of NYS OMH contracts.

In recognition of the service and sacrifices made by service-disabled veterans and in recognition of their economic activity in doing business in New York State, applicants are expected to consider SDVOBs in the fulfillment of the requirements of the Contract. Such participation may be as subcontractors or suppliers, as proteges, or in other partnering or supporting roles.

NYS OMH hereby establishes an overall goal of 0% for SDVOB participation, based on the current availability of qualified SDVOBs. For purposes of providing meaningful participation by SDVOBs, the Applicant/Contractor would reference the directory of New York State Certified SDVOBs found at https://ogs.ny.gov/Veterans. Additionally, following any resulting Contract execution, Contractor would be encouraged to contact the Office of General Services' Division of Service-Disabled Veterans' Business Development to discuss additional methods of maximizing participation by SDVOBs on the Contract.

It would be required that "good faith efforts" to provide meaningful participation by SDVOBs as subcontractors or suppliers in the performance of a resulting awarded Contract as documented.

3.7 Equal Opportunity Employment

By submission of a bid or proposal in response to this solicitation, the Applicant/Contractor agrees with all terms and conditions of Master Contract for Grants, Section IV(J) – Standard Clauses for All New York State Contracts including Clause 12 – Equal Employment Opportunities for Minorities and Women. The Contractor is required to ensure that it and any subcontractors awarded a subcontract over \$25,000 for the construction, demolition, replacement, major repair, renovation, planning or design of real property and improvements thereon (the "Work"), except where the Work is for the beneficial use of the Contractor, undertake or continue programs to ensure that minority group members and women are afforded equal employment opportunities without discrimination because of race, creed, color, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status. For these purposes, equal opportunity shall apply in the areas of recruitment, employment, job assignment, promotion, upgrading, demotion, transfer, layoff, termination, and rates of pay or other forms of compensation. This requirement does not apply to (i) work, goods, or services unrelated to the Contract; or (ii) employment outside New York State.

The Applicant will be required to submit a Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprises and Equal Opportunity Policy Statement, o the State Contracting Agency with their bid or proposal. To ensure compliance with this Section, the Applicant will be required to submit with the bid or proposal an Equal Opportunity Staffing Plan (Form # to be supplied during contracting process) identifying the anticipated work force to be utilized on the Contract. If awarded a Contract, Contractor shall submit a Workforce Utilization Report, in such format as shall be required by the Contracting State Agency on a monthly or quarterly basis during the term of the contract. Further, pursuant to Article 15 of the Executive Law (the "Human Rights Law"), all other State and Federal statutory and constitutional and non-discrimination provisions, the Contractor and sub-contractors will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment status because of race, creed (religion), color, sex, national origin, sexual orientation, military status, age, disability, predisposing genetic characteristic, marital status, or domestic violence victim status, and shall also follow the requirements of the Human Rights Law with regard to non-discrimination on the basis of prior criminal conviction and prior arrest. Please Note: Failure to comply with the foregoing requirements may result in a finding of nonresponsiveness, non-responsibility and/or a breach of the Contract, leading to the withholding of funds, suspension or termination of the Contract or such other actions or enforcement proceedings as allowed by the Contract.

3.8 Sexual Harassment Prevention Certification

State Finance Law §139-I requires applicants on state procurements to certify that they have a written policy addressing sexual harassment prevention in the workplace and provide annual sexual harassment training (that meets the Department of Labor's model policy and training standards) to all its employees. Bids that do not contain the certification may not be considered for award; provided however, that if the applicant cannot make the certification, the applicant may provide a statement with their bid detailing the reasons why the certification cannot be made. A template certification document is being provided as part of this RFP.

Applicants must complete and return the certification with their bid, or provide a statement detailing why the certification cannot be made.

3.9 Bid Response

Neither the State of New York or OMH shall be responsible for the costs or expenses incurred by the applicant in preparation or presentation of the bid proposal.

3.10 Acceptance of Terms and Conditions

A bid, in order to be responsive to this solicitation, must satisfy the specifications set forth in this RFP. A detailed description of this format and content requirements is presented in Section 2.10 of this RFP.

3.11 Freedom of Information Requirements

All proposals submitted for NYS OMH's consideration will be held in confidence. However, the resulting contract is subject to New York State Freedom of Information Law (FOIL). Therefore, if an applicant believes that any information in its bid constitutes a trade secret or should otherwise be treated as confidential and wishes such information not be disclosed if requested, pursuant to FOIL (Article 6 of Public Officer's Law), the applicant must submit with its bid, a separate letter specifically identifying the page number(s), line(s), or other appropriate designation(s) containing such information explaining in detail why such information is a trade secret and formally requesting that such information be kept confidential. Failure by an applicant to submit such a letter with its bid identifying trade secrets will constitute a waiver by the applicant of any rights it may have under Section 89(5) of the Public Officers Law relating to the protection of trade secrets. The proprietary nature of the information designated confidential by the applicant may be subject to disclosure if ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction. A request that an entire bid be kept confidential is not advisable since a bid cannot reasonably consist of all data subject to a FOIL proprietary status.

3.12 NYS and OMH Policies

The applicant/contractor must agree to comply with all applicable New York State and OMH policies, procedures, regulations, and directives throughout the Term of the contract.

4. Evaluation Factors and Awards

4.1 Evaluation Criteria

All proposals will be rated and ranked in order of highest score based on an evaluation of each applicant's written submission as well as NYS OMH internal reviews.

The Evaluation will apply points in the following categories as defined in Section 6:

For a detailed description of evaluation criteria for the Technical Evaluation and the Financial Assessment components, see Section 6 (Proposal Narrative).

4.2 Method for Evaluating Proposals

Designated staff will review each proposal for completeness and verify that all eligibility criteria are met. A complete proposal shall include all required components as described in Section 2.10. If a proposal is not complete or does not meet the basic eligibility and participation standards as outlined in Section 2.5, the proposal will be eliminated from further review. The agency will be notified of the rejection of its proposal within 10 working days of the proposal due date.

Proposals will be conducted in two parts: Technical Evaluation and Financial Assessment. The technical evaluation committee, consisting of at least three evaluators, will review the technical portion of each proposal and compute a technical score. A financial score will be computed separately based on the operating budget and budget narrative submitted.

Evaluators of the Technical Evaluation component may then meet to discuss the basis of those ratings. Following the discussion, evaluators may independently revise their original score in any section. Once completed, final Technical Evaluation scores will then be recalculated, averaged, and applied to the final Financial Assessment score to arrive at final scores.

Any proposal not receiving a minimum score of 70 will be eliminated from consideration.

In case of a tie in the scoring process, the proposal with the highest score on the Description of Program (Section 6.2) of the Proposal Narrative will be ranked higher.

4.3 Process for Awarding Contracts

4.3.1 Initial Awards and Allocations

Proposals will be ranked, and one award made to the applicant with the highest score to assume the operation of an Older Adult ACT team in The Bronx.

Teams will be expected to be licensed and admitting individuals within three (3) months of the contract start date.

4.3.2 Contract Termination and Reassignment

There are a number of factors that may result in the contract being reassigned. This includes, but is not limited to, failure to meet start-up milestones, failure to maintain staff to client ratio, excluding referrals based on criminal or substance abuse history, or poor performance outcomes. A contractor will be provided notification if there is need for reassignment.

To reassign the contract, NYS OMH will go to the next highest ranked proposal. If there are no agencies left with a passing score, NYS OMH will go to the top of the list and work its way down the list to reassign the contract.

4.4 Award Notification

At the conclusion of the procurement, notification will be sent to successful and non-successful applicants. All awards are subject to approval by the NYS Attorney General and the Office of the State Comptroller before an operating contract can be finalized.

5. Scope of Work

5.1 Introduction

Through this RFP, NYS OMH will make available funds for the development of one (1) Older Adult ACT team, size 48 capacity in the Bronx. ACT providers must commit to meeting ACT start-up requirements, including program location, staffing, and monthly ramp up. ACT team start-up will include NYS OMH involvement to provide support around the development of the team, including monthly calls and meetings.

The selected agency will establish the Older Adult ACT team according to the ACT Program Guidelines which can be found in the pre- submission uploads in the Grant's Gateway, the Standards of Care, which can be found in the pre-submission uploads in the Grant's Gateway, and New York Rules and Regulations Part 508, and the Older Adult ACT enhancements outlined in section 5.2 of this RFP. The agency must demonstrate its capacity to provide NYS OMH-licensed ACT services to 48 individuals who meet the eligibility criteria detailed in the ACT Program Guidelines and Section1.2 of this RFP.

The agency must collaborate with the applicable NYS OMH Field Office, LGU and SPOA, NYS Office for the Aging (NYSOFA), NYC Aging, Extended Care/Nursing Facilities, adult home and assisted living residences, acute and state-operated psychiatric hospitals and residences, and community-based providers (among other potential referral sources) to target appropriate individuals for this high need service.

The agency should develop coordinated admission and transition plans with Health Home(s), Specialty Mental Health Care Management Agencies, acute and state-operated psychiatric hospitals, Extended Care/Nursing Facilities, Transitional Case Management Teams, Critical Time Intervention Programs, Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) Programs, Managed Care Plans, Community Oriented Recovery & Empowerment Services (CORE), Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) providers, Personalized Recovery Oriented Services (PROS), Mental Health Outpatient Treatment and Rehabilitative Services (MHOTRS)/Clinic, and other community services to identify and deliver services and supports for individuals to ensure their successful transition into less intensive community-based services. The agency is expected to contract with Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) and to negotiate single-case agreements for out-of-network individuals.

5.2 Objectives and Responsibilities

Older Adult ACT Providers will follow the fidelity of the ACT model, providing the majority of the services in a fully integrated behavioral health and physical health approach.

Older Adult ACT Providers will serve 48 individuals and maintain the staffing ratio at no more than 10:1.

The Older Adult ACT Provider will receive referrals from SPOA. Once the assignment is made, the assigned Older Adult ACT provider will directly coordinate warm handoff and/or engagement efforts with the assigned individual.

Older Adult ACT Providers must adhere to the fidelity of the ACT model and ACT Program Guidelines, including but not limited to:

- Providing services that are tailored to meet the individual's specific needs;
- Building a multi-disciplinary team including members from the fields of psychiatry, nursing, psychology, social work, substance use, vocational rehabilitation, and peer with lived experiences in behavioral health and as an older adult. Based on their respective areas of expertise, the team members will collaborate to deliver integrated services of the individual's choice, assist in making progress towards goals, and adjust services over time to meet the individual's changing

needs and goals;

- Knowledge of the implications of social determinants and the likely inherent disparities in areas such as healthcare access, housing, employment status, food security;
- Delivering comprehensive and flexible treatment, support, and rehabilitation services to individuals in their natural living settings rather than in hospital or clinic settings. This means that interventions and skills training will be carried out at the locations where individuals live, work, and socialize, and where support is needed;
- Engaging individuals with co-occurring substance use, histories of trauma, and justice involvement;
- Using key components of Evidence-Based Practices to inform treatment, and will be derived from models such as Critical Time Intervention, Integrated Dual Disorder Treatment, Motivational Interviewing, Contingency Management, Trauma Informed Care, Harm Reduction, etc.; and
- Maintaining the organizational capacity to ensure small caseloads and continuity of care. The contractor will maintain the minimum staffing ratio of ten (10) individuals to one (1) staff.

Older Adult ACT Providers must adhere to the team protocols as outlined in the ACT Program Guidelines including but not limited to:

- Conduct in person contacts based on need while additionally meeting any billing requirements. Minimum number of in person contacts for billing requirements shall not dictate number of visits provided each month;
- Communication with Primary Care Physician/ other medical providers, hospitals, Emergency Rooms, or Comprehensive Psychiatric Emergency Programs (CPEPs) if an individual is admitted and planning for the transition back to the community upon discharge;
- Psychiatrist and Nurse Practitioner of Psychiatry (NPP) conduct, at minimum, one (1) visit in the community on a quarterly basis;
- Conduct team meetings at least four (4) times a week to review the status of each individual; and
- Maintain communication boards, logs, and other communication methods.

Older Adult ACT Providers will:

- Assess for risk and protective factors, suicide risk, violence risk, substance use, health, social isolation, and clinical needs using standardized screening and assessment instruments initially and then as needed.
- Assess all individuals every six (6) months for progress and level of care, as indicated in ACT Program Guidelines.

- Have a clear understanding of the service needs of older adults with SMI and a demonstrated ability to coordinate services internally and externally.
- Serve individuals residing anywhere in the county where they
 provide services. If an individual moves between counties (due to
 geographic choice, reunification with family and/or friends, and/or
 a desire to move in with or near a friend), the ACT team will assist
 the individual with this transition and work with DOHMH to
 arrange a warm hand-off to the appropriate available service in
 the location of preference.
- Have all staff cross-trained for specialty role areas, Family Specialist, Substance Use Specialist, and Vocational Specialist.
- Treat co-occurring substance use disorders, including use of Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) for tobacco, alcohol, and opioid use disorders and stage-matched treatments for all substance use disorders (SUD) (e.g., Motivational Interviewing for precontemplation/contemplation/preparation; skills building and Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for action/maintenance). Older Adult ACT Providers may also need to collaborate and coordinate with providers of Chemical Dependence, Inpatient Rehabilitation, Medically Managed Detoxification, Chemical Dependence Medically Supervised Inpatient and Outpatient Withdrawal, and other Office of Addiction Supports and Services (OASAS), licensed and/or designated programs and harm reduction, including syringe exchange programs, to work closely, and ensure warm hand offs.
- Implement broad harm reduction strategies including safer use, managed use, and meeting people "where they are at", including prescribing naloxone or registering to become an opioid overdose prevention program (OOPP) and directly distributing naloxone to adults.
- Be competent in the transitional practice framework and the dimensions of 1) engagement, 2) skills of self-management and 3) transfer of care and community engagement as found in the Transition Manual for ACT Providers.
- Service provision should be considered outside of the standard Monday-Friday, 9:00am – 5:00pm hours. It is the expectation that the team will have flexible work hours to allow for better engagement and to better accommodate needs/schedules, (e.g., 10:00am – 6:00pm, 11:00am – 7:00pm, weekends, etc.).
- Provide emergency and crisis intervention services 24 hours a day, seven (7) days a week, as outlined in the ACT Program Guidelines.
- Complete all required training as outlined in the ACT Program Guidelines. ACT Providers shall utilize Center for Practice Innovations (CPI) ACT Institute as a resource for continued training through the Learning Management System and in-

person/web-based trainings, Role Support calls, consultations, and additional Technical Assistance for the ACT model.

Older Adult ACT Providers will effectively deliver geriatric enhancements to the ACT model by:

- Using standardized screening tools to assess for and validate for use with older adults (if available) signs of substance use/addiction, misuse of prescribed medication, anxiety, depression, suicidality, and assess for specific risk factors associated with aging such as social isolation/loneliness, cognitive decline and impaired executive functioning, Alzheimer's disease and other related dementias, psychosis, and chronic medical conditions;
- Developing treatment plans to reduce negative risk factors;
- Assessing for risk factors associated with aging, social isolation/loneliness, experiences of trauma, discrimination, marginalization, and financial insecurity, and compromised mobility, hearing, vision and chronic medical conditions;
- Developing and implementing strategies for maintaining continuity of care during periods of hospitalizations and medical complications, including regular communication with the treating provider and Primary Care Physician during this time of inactivity;
- Providing clinical services, including psychotherapy, cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT), dialectical behavior treatment (DBT), and other therapies and psychosocial interventions shown to reduce psychological symptoms in older adults;
- Knowledgeable about the complex interplay between physical health, mental health, and the accelerated aging process experienced by older adults with co-occurring complex medical conditions;
- Knowledge of community resources available specifically for older adults with an awareness of how ageism can affect service provision and willingness to engage in services;
- Understanding of existing and emerging anxiety, depression, and serious mental illness including Bipolar disorder and Schizophrenia that manifests in older adults;
- Advocacy and education on entitlements to address social determinants of health and medical care coordination across service sectors;
- Establishing collaborative relationships with health plans and understanding the different Medicare and Medicaid Health Plans (duals) for older adults;
- Knowledge of mental health problems among older adults, such as: the impacts of social isolation/loneliness, bereavement, family dynamics, and loss of independence. Mental and physical health

impacts on affective and anxiety disorders, dementia, and psychosis. Many older adults also suffer from sleep and behavior disorders, and cognitive decline.

5.3 Implementation

Older Adult ACT Providers will provide an adequate level of professional staffing to perform the required work.

Older Adult ACT Providers will have office space that is appropriately located, and adequately appointed to comply with state licensing standards by the program start date.

Older Adult ACT Providers will hire the following required core staff for start-up: Psychiatrist or NPP, Registered Nurse, Team Leader, and Program Assistant prior to becoming licensed. All ACT staff will have the appropriate qualifications to meet the needs of the target population and will do so in a timeline that maintains the staff ratio of no more than 10:1. The team should not admit more than four (4) individuals each month.

ACT Staff Requirements:

- i. 1 FTE Team Leader
- ii. 1 FTE Licensed Registered Nurse
- iii. 1 FTE Substance Use Specialist
- iv. 1 FTE Family Specialist
- v. 1 FTE Older Adult Specialist

Required staff not included in individual to staff ratio:

- vi. 0.48 FTE Psychiatrist or 0.70 FTE NPP
- vii. 1 FTE Program Assistant

Older Adult ACT providers will maintain a plan for regular supervision of all staff members, including the Team Leader.

Older Adult ACT providers will ensure that staff are trained in evidencebased practices such as CBT, DBT, Integrated Dual Disorder Treatment (IDDT), Focus on Integrated Treatment (FIT), Critical Time Intervention (CTI), Motivational Interviewing, Trauma Informed Care and Substance Use Principles (required FIT modules and OASAS supplemented training). Older Adult ACT Team staff will complete all of the trainings identified in the Center for Practice Innovations (CPI) ACT Institute Curriculum, as required by NYS OMH, within the required timeframes. Older Adult ACT providers shall ensure staff are continually trained, especially regarding areas where there is a need for knowledge acquisition and specific populations being served on the team, including but not limited to: social isolation, substance use, homelessness, dementia, psychosis, and chronic medical conditions. Supplemental training includes HOPES Training. This training is focused on education and skills required for working with the older adult population.

The Helping Older People Experience Success (HOPES) program is designed to improve independent functioning of older adults with SMI living in the community and help them continue living in the community by teaching them social skills, community living, and healthy living skills. Staff training opportunities include but are not limited to:

- i. Communicating effectively
- ii. Making and keeping friends
- iii. Making the most of leisure time
- iv. Healthy living
- v. Using medications effectively
- vi. Making the most of a healthcare visit

Additional training in:

- vii. Understanding complex medical conditions
- viii. Understanding Geriatric Care
- ix. Bereavement counseling and support
- x. Understanding the effects of social isolation and loneliness
- xi. The clinical impact of aging

5.4 Utilization Review, Reporting and Quality Improvement

Older Adult ACT Providers must comply with all NYS OMH fiscal reporting requirements as outlined in the <u>Aid to Localities Spending Plan</u> <u>Guidelines</u>.

Older Adult ACT Providers will have a systemic approach for selfmonitoring and ensuring ongoing quality improvement for the ACT team, including analyzing utilization review findings and recommendations, utilization of the team Profile and Tableau, and use of the NYS fidelity tool once available. This information should be used to measure individual achievement of recovery goals, performance around length of stays, barriers to treatment, staffing, timeliness of transitions, etc., and will inform the team's overall quality improvement plan. Older Adult ACT Providers will participate in Utilization Management activities according to the terms of contracts with Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) and Local Government Unit (LGU), as applicable. Additionally, the team will utilize technical assistance from NYS OMH, counties, MCOs, and the ACT Institute when appropriate to work towards improvement of quality outcomes. Older Adult ACT Providers will have an Incident Management Policy consistent with <u>New York Code Rules and Regulations Part 524</u> and the Justice Center requirements and conform to the reporting and follow-up requirements of each.

Older Adult ACT Providers will be required to maintain accurate reporting of all admissions, six (6) month follow ups, and discharges through NYS OMH's Child and Adult Integrated Reporting System (CAIRS) and adhere to any requirements NYS OMH may subsequently develop.

Older Adult ACT Providers will complete regular reports on all individuals who are court mandated to the County AOT Coordinator, per County guidelines.

Older Adult ACT Providers should ensure continuous quality improvement of ACT services and development of the program including regular monitoring and evaluation of treatment/rehabilitation outcomes.

Older Adult ACT Providers will participate in site visits from NYS OMH.

5.5 Operating Funding

One-time start-up funds \$100,000 and ramp up funds \$50,000 will be allocated as a lump sum at beginning of contract for a total of \$450,000.

Older Adult ACT providers will be funded though Medicaid and net deficit funding, per the approved ACT Model for a Downstate 48 slot Team.

The annual expected Medicaid revenue per team is as follows:

48 Slot Team: Downstate \$862,428

Available annual net deficit funding per team is as follows:

48 Slot Team: Downstate \$92,283 and receive service dollars in the amount of \$25,790. Appropriate uses of these funds are outlined in Service Dollar Guidance.

Describe clinical approaches and/or best practice in treatment and care for older adults with SMI, who may also have cooccurring substance use disorders, physical health conditions, history of complex trauma and may have extensive complex medical needs requiring intensive, cross service sector care coordination.
- d. Describe and demonstrate the agency's experience in engaging older adults with SMI, co-occurring disorders, history of complex trauma, and who may have extensive complex medical needs. Provide a description of the assertive engagement practices and strategies to be used and targeted to the population to be served.
- e. 6.5 Utilization Review, Reporting, and Quality Improvement

- a. Describe how the agency will ensure the ACT Team is adhering to expected standards put forth by NYS OMH, including the fidelity of the model and team protocols as outlined in the ACT Program Guidelines, Standards of Care, the Tool for Measurement of ACT (TMACT), and forthcoming, the New York State Fidelity Tool.
- b. Describe the proposed approach for self-monitoring and ongoing quality improvement for the ACT Team. 6.7 Financial Assessment
